Dr. Andrew Hedmeg, state health officer, announced two key appointments to his Central Office staff in January.

Dr. Edward J. Ireland, former dean of Loyola University's College of Pharmacy, was appointed chief of the newly created Narcotics and Drug Control Section of the Food & Drug Division. Dr. John Norton was named head of the Division of Dental Health.

Dr. Norton was highly recommended by the Louisiana State Dental Society (LSDS) which created a special committee to screen and interview candidates for the position.

At their request, Dental Health (established as a section in 1940) was separated from the School Health Program and upgraded to division status with the emphasis on preventive dental health. This was also recommended by the State Nutrition Council.

The division's first priority will be to encourage fluoridation of municipal water supplies, Dr. Hedmeg stated.

Dr. Ireland will administer the state's new "Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substances Law" (No. 457 of 1970) which regulates manufacture, transportation, sale, possession and use of narcotic drugs, sedatives, tranquilizers, stimulants, hallucinogens and other dangerous controlled drugs manufactured in or shipped into the state. It provides for licensing of responsible manufacturers, distributors and professional dispensers.

Dr. Hedmeg said the law supersedes Louisiana's "Uniform Narcotics Law" passed in 1934 which limited the health department's regulatory power to manufacturers and wholesalers of narcotics but did not include "other drugs subject to abuse." He emphasized that the law in no way gives the department any authority that would conflict with the licensure and regulatory powers of other state boards over the practices of the various professions concerned.

Dr. Norton will work closely with the state Dental Society to develop various prophylactic (disease prevention) services particularly among the medically indigent and for handicapped children.

A native of Minnesota, Dr. Norton comes to Louisiana from a one year dental health residency with the Jefferson County health department in Birmingham, Ala.

He obtained his D.D.S. and Master's in Public Health at the University of Minnesota. He was in private practice for over 17 years in Rochester, Minn.

Dr. Hedmeg said that Dr. Ireland will have a minimal staff, preferably with training in the field of pharmacy and operating on a regional basis, which will conduct periodic inventory checks to detect possible "leakages" in the normal distribution channels of "controlled" drugs in the state.

Dr. Ireland and Leo W. Spath, state Food and Drug Division head were briefed on federal enforcement procedures at a U.S. Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Seminar January 24-28 in Atlanta.

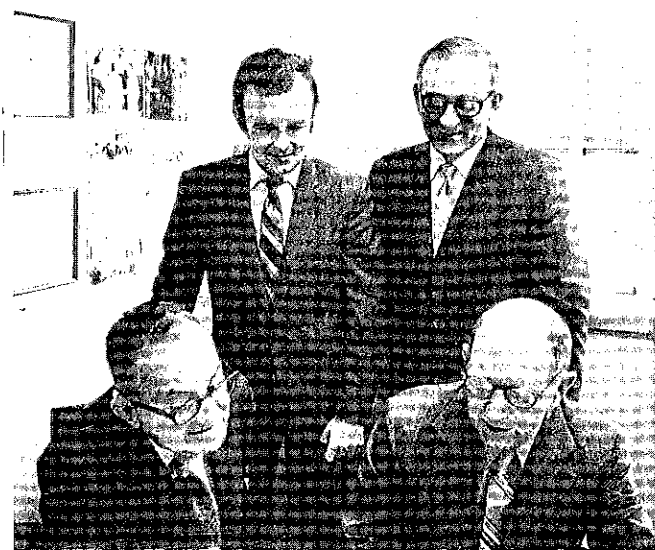

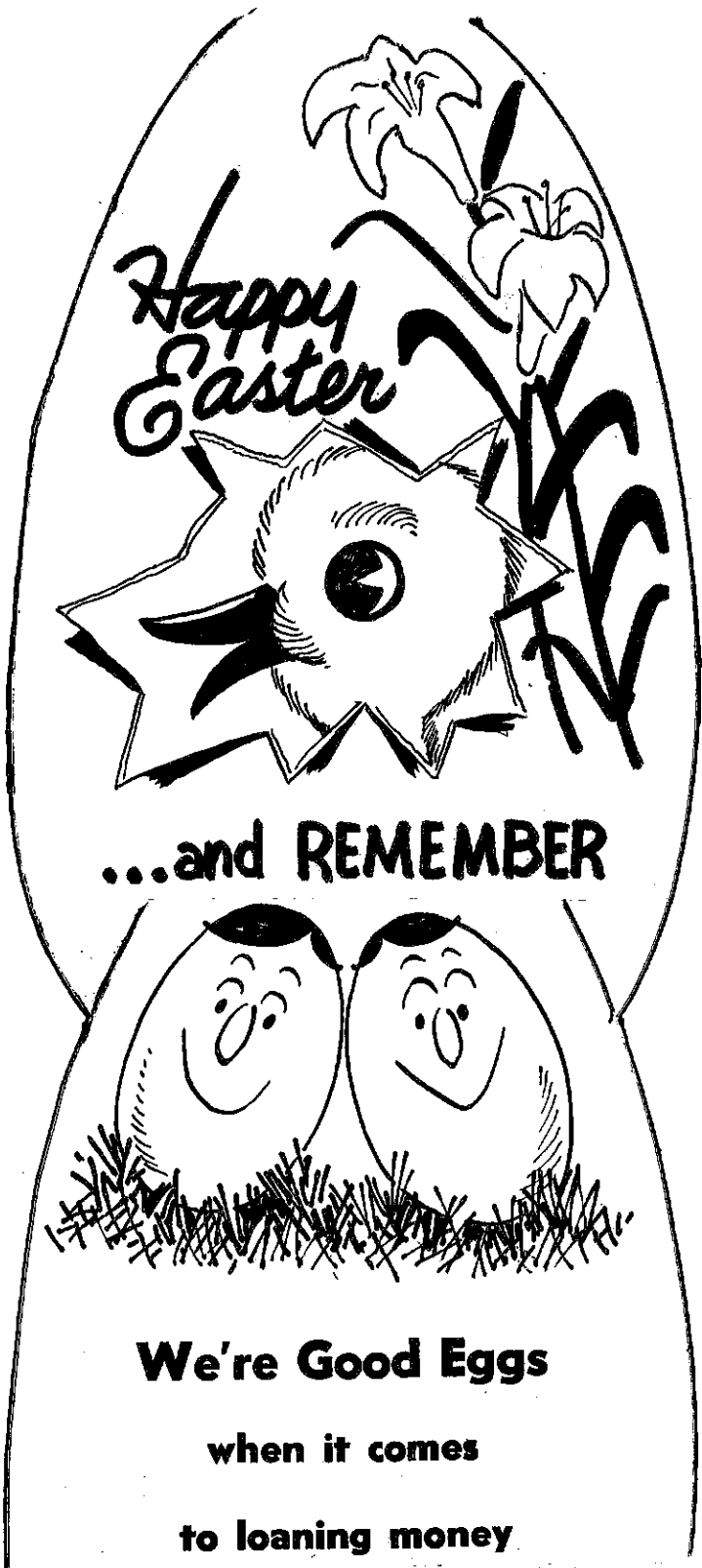

**SAFETY COMMISSION LISTS
MOST HAZARDOUS PRODUCTS**

The National Commission on Product Safety has reported to the President, Congress, health authorities and other interested groups that Americans are exposed to "unreasonable" hazards from some 17 household products and appliances that claim responsibility for 20 million injuries each year—of which some 110,000 result in permanent disability and 30,000 end in death.

Products found by the Commission to be unreasonably hazardous were: glass doors, vaporizers, bikes, furniture polish, power mowers, toys, color TV sets, fireworks, floor furnaces, glass bottles, household chemicals, infant furniture, ladders, power tools, protective headgear, unvented gas heaters, and wringer washing machines.

FEWER ACCIDENTS, BETTER TREATMENT CAN SOLVE HOSPITAL BED SHORTAGE

Two entirely different reasons for nationwide shortage of hospital beds have been suggested - one by a state health department, the other by a prominent North Carolina physician.

Florida's health and rehabilitative services department says reducing the nonfatal rate of accidents, (27,800 per 100,000 annually) many of which require lengthy hospitalization and expensive medical care, would help eliminate the shortage of nurses and make more hospital beds available.

In his nationally syndicated "Viewpoint" newspaper column subtitled "The Facts About Medical Care", Jesse Helms comments on Dr. Amos Johnson's testimony before a U.S. Senate subcommittee:

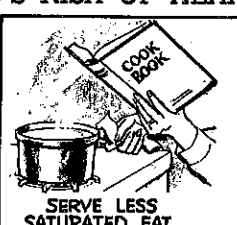
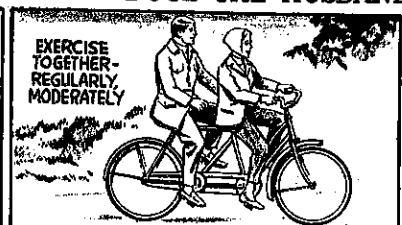
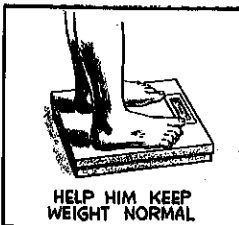
"Dr. Johnson notes that some 'experts' believe that the country needs or will shortly need twice as many hospital beds as it now has. He suspects that we may already have twice as many as we really need - if existing ideas about treatment of patients were changed! The results, he says, would be better treatment of the ill, at vastly less cost.

"Too many people are sent to the hospital and too many stay there too long" Dr. Johnson contends.
