REVIEW OF STATE REPORT CARD

Lindsey Viscarra, NORD State Policy Manager (Western Region), briefly discussed the National Organization for Rare Disorders (NORD) the State Report Card. This initiative was developed to assess how well states support people with rare diseases and to provide advocates with a tool for driving change. The report card covers the following nine key policy areas: Medicaid Financial Eligibility, Medical Nutrition, Newborn Screening, Protecting Patients in State Medicaid Programs, Protecting Patients in State-Regulated Insurance, Rare Disease Advisory Councils, Step Therapy (Fail First), Telehealth, & Prescription Drug Out-of-Pocket Costs. The recent edition, updated in November 2023, aims to guide patients, advocates, and policymakers in improving state policies to better meet the needs of the rare disease community.

LEGISLATIVE BILLS

Lauren Williams shared details about legislation related to individuals diagnosed with a rare disease passed by Congress. The Creating Hope Reauthorization Act (<u>H.R. 7384 | S 4583</u>) reauthorizes the Rare Pediatric Disease Priority Review Voucher (PRV) program for six years, ensuring this vital incentive that has no cost to taxpayers can continue to spur innovation in rare diseases that disproportionately affect children.

The Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act (H.R. 4758 | S 2372) requires state Medicaid programs to establish a process through which qualifying out-of-state providers may enroll as participating providers for five years without undergoing additional screening requirements, unless the state has an agreement with other states that governs coverage of children with medically complex conditions that is in accordance with specified guidance from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). Among other requirements, a qualifying provider must (1) serve individuals under the age of 21; (2) have previously been screened for Medicare participation or for participation in the Medicaid program of the state in which the provider is located; and (3) have been determined by the CMS or state Medicaid program to pose a limited risk of fraud, waste, or abuse.

The HELP Copays Act (<u>H.R. 830</u>) requires health insurance plans to apply certain payments made by, or on behalf of, a plan enrollee toward a plan's cost-sharing requirements. Specifically, plans must apply third-party payments, financial assistance, discounts, product vouchers, and other reductions in out-of-pocket expenses toward the requirements.

RDAC WEBSITE & ANNUAL LEGISLATIVE REPORT CONTENT

Members will continue to review content for the RDAC website. Members agreed that more resources should be included and the overall list should be reorganized based on diagnosis to accommodate viewers. It was agreed the resources list must be revised and members' bios be added before submitting the draft for publishing.

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
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2025 LEGISLATION REVISIONS
